# Never Under Estimate A Minority – w. s. Churchill

On Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> September I went with my son and daughter-in-law to Basingstoke station where we joined several hundred other Liberty and Livelihood marchers to board a specially chartered train for London. Before departing the Bishop of Basingstoke held a short service and gave us his blessing. Our leader was a tall chap holding aloft a salmon rod with a bunch of golden balloons tied to it! Our companions on the train were very cheerful, full of stories of the last March, and they represented every conceivable country pursuit and way of living. There were many different banners expressing their feelings and hopes, often in quite colourful language!

At Waterloo we joined the throng and walked fairly easily along the south embankment, all the time being joined by more and more people until we were walking at a snail's pace. We were able to have a good look at the Globe Theatre which is a wonderful re-creation of Shakespeare's original theatre. We crossed the river at London Bridge and walked towards Whitehall. At intervals we saw the salmon rod bobbing cheerfully ahead of us. As we passed under the bridges the noise of the whistles, horns and cheering was greatly magnified, a strange and stirring sound.

As we reached Whitehall we joined with the marchers who had started from Hyde Park, and by this time we fully realised the size of the turnout. Nevertheless, quite by chance we bumped into my nephew and his family. Passing the Cenotaph the crowd fell silent as a mark of respect. At the end of Whitehall we could see the tally on the digital counter constantly rising which gave us a sense of contributing personally to the final total. There were a few anti-hunt protesters in Parliament Square who could think of nothing more original that to shout "go home scum".

However, this was all taken in good spirit and given the numbers marching, was quite brave of the protesters to be there at all. Having been counted, Alexander, never one to miss an opportunity for a good meal, marched us off to Soho for a Chinese.

Back on the train, weary but satisfied, we reviewed the day. If 407,791 people, nearly HALF A MILLION, from all parts of the country and many from abroad, marched through the streets of London, the biggest march ever, surely Mr Blair and the Government of the day will have to listen to us.

#### FOOTBALL -'NOT JUST FOR BOYS'

#### PEPPARKAKOR BISCUITS

400g/3 cups sifted flour
1 tsp bicarbonate of soda
1½ tsps ground ginger
ground cloves and circuamon
230g/1 cup butter or margarine
230g/1 cup dark brown sugar
2 egg whites

Sift flour, spices and soda. Cream butter and sugar until very fluffy then beat in egg whites. Slowly work in dry ingredients. Wrap and chill for 12 hours.

Heat oven to 350°C (Gas Mark 4).

Roll out dough to ½cm thick on lightly floured board. Cut into as many fancy shapes as you have different cutters. Place on ungreased baking sheet, leaving space between. Cook for 10-12 minutes until light brown round edge. Cool on wire racks.

Prepare icing while biscuits cool. Blend icing sugar (about 1230g/1 cup) with 1 egg white. Make it stiff enough to pipe, in your own chosen patterns, on to biscuits.

### Pavilion set to grow – your help needed

#### The Belle of Hornton

Can any reader shed light on a character from the Victorian era mentioned in a well-known book....?

Reading Flora Thompson's trilogy Lark Rise to Candleford – one of the best loved books about rural Oxfordshire – I was surprised to come across a mention of Hornton and one of its former residents....

Describing some of the reallife characters in the small Oxfordshire hamlet of Juniper back in the 1880s, the author refers to her arandmother as the former 'Belle of Hornton', one Hannah Pollard.

The chapter continues by giving an idea of Hannah's simple life and character. "She had been very pretty when she was young. Belle of Hornton' they had called her in her native village and she often told Laura of the time when her hair had reached down to her knees. like a great yellow cape...." We learn too that she was an avid reader of novelettes and was married to a countryside eggler (travelling egg seller) and local preacher in Juniper.

Flora Thompson herself was a cottage child born in 1877 and brought up in Juniper, renamed Lark Rise in the book. She wrote the book in 1939, recalling the scenes and daily life of her Oxfordshire home. Banbury is also mentioned in the book.

If anyone knows of Hannah Pollard or heard previous generations ever talk about her, please let *The Gossip* know.

The time of year is upon us, when many gardeners are preparing for the traditional autumn tidy-up, which from a wildlife viewpoint, is one of the most unfortunate elements about gardening in the UK! For many birds and animals this can be a time of plenty with an abundance of seeds, berries and nuts upon which to gorge in preparation or winter. So think twice before you tidy the flower borders, cut away clumps of vegetation and trim hedges. Clearing out all those dead-seed heads and removing vegetation effectively destroys many of natural wildlife food sources and areas of shelter of value to your garden wildlife!
